ABOUT THE DEPARTMENT

Graduates may receive a Bachelor of Arts (BA) in English with a Concentration in Literature or a BA in English with a Concentration in Writing. A major in English combines well with study in many other fields, such as African-American Studies, Appalachian Studies, Communications, History, Peace and Social Justice Studies, Philosophy, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology, Theatre, and Women's and Gender Studies. Students often double major with Education Studies to earn a P-12 teaching certificate.

OPPORTUNITIES & INTERNSHIPS

- English majors may apply for department-funded grants that can be used to support student travel to/and or participation in off campus conferences, workshops, lectures, internships, domestic and international study opportunities.
- There are labor positions, working with English faculty as teaching assistants or research assistants.
- In order to complete the major, students put together an English Portfolio, a culmination of their academic work and achievements signed off by their academic advisor. The English Portfolio is important

for graduates taking the next step in either their careers or education.
