Celebrating Work Well Done in the world of Old Time Music

This year we hosted the 49th Annual Celebration of Traditional Music and had the privilege of honoring the work of two remarkable individuals, Harry Rice and John Harrod.



Harry Rice is the winner for this year's Local Hero Award for his dedication in preserving an extensive collection in audio/visual materials documenting Appalachian music and culture.

In 1996 Rice began volunteering with the sound archives, became part time, and then became the full-time Sound Archivist in Hutchins Library, Special Collections. He has spearheaded the Sound Archives Fellowship Program, acted as Berea co-host with the Library of Congress Alan Lomax Collection, and served on the Celebration of Traditional Music Committee for as long as anyone can remember.



John Harrod is the winner for this year's Lifetime Achievement Award, for his documentation, recording, and performance of traditional fiddle music for more than 45 years.

Harrod has taught Fiddle at the Augusta Heritage Center, Port Townsend, Washington, and the Cowan Creek Mountain Music School. He continues to play with the band, *Kentucky Wild Horse* and with his daughter Anna Harrod. He was the recipient for the 2004 Folk Heritage Award of the Governor's Awards in the Arts. "Where I come from the mountain flowers grow wild."
