SEPTEMBER 3: PARYUSHANA PARVA (Jainism)

Eight-day festival of forgiveness.

SEPTEMBER 7-8*: ROSH HASHANAH (Judaism)

Beginning of the Jewish Year and High Holy Days.

SEPTEMBER 10: GANESH CHATURTHI (Hinduism)

Birthday of Lord Ganesha, god of wisdom, prosperity, and good fortune and the remover of obstacles.

SEPTEMBER 16*: YOM KIPPUR (Judaism)

Day of Atonement.

SEPTEMBER 21-27*: SUKKOT (Judaism)

The Feast of the Tabernacles.

SEPTEMBER 22: MABON (Paganism/Wicca)

Celebrates the autumnal equinox through a ritual of thanksgiving for the fruits of the earth.

SEPTEMBER 28*: SHEMINI ATZERET (Judaism)

Marks the end of Sukkot.

SEPTEMBER 29*: SIMCHAT TORAH (Judaism)

Celebrates the conclusion of the annual cycle of public Torah readings and the beginning of a new cycle.

OCTOBER 6-14: NAVRATRI (Hinduism)

Festival of nine nights celebrating the Goddess Durga.

OCTOBER 15: DUSSEHRA (Hinduism)

Celebrates Lord Rama's triumph over evil King Ravana.

OCTOBER 19*: MAWLID AL-NABI (Islam)

Commemorates birthday of prophet Muhammad.

OCTOBER 27: BUDDHA'S DESCENT (Buddhism)

Lhabab Duchen celebrates the descent of Buddha from heaven to earth.

OCTOBER 31: SAMHAIN (Paganism/Wicca)

Festival honoring endings, beginnings and the dead.

OCTOBER 31: REFORMATION DAY (Protestant Christianity)

Celebration of the onset of the Reformation.

NOVEMBER 1: ALL SAINT'S DAY (Christianity)

Honors all the saints known and unknown.

NOVEMBER 2: ALL SOUL'S DAY (Christianity)

Day of prayer for the dead.

NOVEMBER 2-6: DIWALI (Hinduism, Jainism, Sikhism)

Festival of Lights.

NOVEMBER 6*: BIRTH OF THE BAB (Bahá'í)

Celebrates the birth of the Báb, one of the founders of the Bahá'í Faith.

NOVEMBER 7*: BIRTH OF BAHÁ'U'LLÁH (Bahá'í)

Celebrates the birth of Bahá'u'lláh, the founder of the Bahá'í Faith.

NOVEMBER 15: SHICHI-GO-SAN (Shintoism)

Celebrates the growth and well-being of young children.

NOVEMBER 19: BIRTH OF GURU NANAK (Sikhism)

Celebrates the birth of the founder of Sikhism and the first of the Sikh Gurus.

NOVEMBER 23: NIINAMESAI (Shintoism)

Harvest festival of thanksgiving.

NOVEMBER 25*: DAY OF THE COVENANT (Bahá'í)

Celebrates the appointment of 'Abdu'l-Bahá as the Center of Bahá'u'lláh's Covenant.

NOVEMBER 27*: ASCENSION OF 'ABDU'L-BAHÁ (Bahá'í)

Commemorates death of Abbas Effendi, known as 'Abdu'l-Bahá in 1921.

NOVEMBER 28: FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT (Christianity)

Season of expectant waiting and preparation of the celebration of the Nativity of Jesus at Christmas.

NOVEMBER 29- DECEMBER 6*: HANUKKAH (Judaism)

Festival of Lights commemorating rededication of Second Holy Temple in Jerusalem at time of Maccabean Revolt.

DECEMBER 8: FEAST OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION (Roman Catholic Christianity)

Celebrates the solemn belief in the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

DECEMBER 8: BODHI DAY (Buddhism)

Commemorates the day that the historical Buddha, Siddhartha Gautauma (Shakyamuni), attained enlightenment.

DECEMBER 15: SRIMAD BHAGAVAD GITA JAYANTI (Hinduism)

Lord Krishna revealed the Bhagvad Gītā to Prince Arjuna.

DECEMBER 21: YULE (Paganism/Wicca)

Winter solstice in the northern hemisphere.

DECEMBER 25: CHRISTMAS (Christianity)

Celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ.

DECEMBER 26: ZARATHOSHT DISO (Zoroastrianism)

Commemorates death of Zarathustra.

* Denotes holidays that begin at sundown the prior day.
