
Phelps-Stokes Auditorium – Berea, Kentucky

Kartik Seshadri



Sept. 09 3:00	LARRY D. SHINN President Shinn opens the new academic year, as he shares his expectations and vision for Berea College.
Sept. 12 2:00 Sunday	BEREA'S OWN Various Musical Traditions A musical repertoire by Berea's faculty, staff, and alumni. Sponsored by the Campus Christian Center.
Sept. 16 *8:00	MARCUS ROBERTS TRIO New Orleans Meets Harlem In this program, the trio shows how the stumps, grooves and blues roots of New Orleans' music and ragtime influenced the agile, sophisticated and virtuosic Harlem style. Sept. 23 3:00	THE FAUSTWORK MASK THEATER The Mask Messenger Rob Faust, maskmaker, actor and dancer, dons nearly two dozen masks that "baffle the eye and tickle some sort of primal funny bone." This solo tour de force performance is a mix of monologue, physical comedy and theater that explores the artistic, cultural and psychological use of masks and their power to transform people. Sept. 30 3:00	REV. PAULA MCGEE Accepting Your Greatness Following a professional career as a basketball player, Rev. McGee pursued her calling into Christian ministry. In addition to being a writer, motivational speaker, and ordained minister, she leads the non-profit organization Paula McGee Ministries, where her guiding vision is to inspire every woman to accept and fulfill her call to greatness. Presented as part of the activities of the Accent on Christian Faith Week , cosponsored by the Campus Christian Center, the Ruth Pister-Hampel Memorial Fund, the Black Studies Program, and the Black Cultural Center.
Oct. 07 *8:00	LYDIA McCUALEY AND ENSEMBLE New Music from an Old World A singer, songwriter, and pianist, McCauley has gathered a band with eclectic musical influences—classical, jazz, Middle Eastern, and Celtic. Her songs are laced with medieval, Celtic, and Appalachian tones, and her lyrics betray a poet's sensibility. This program will feature songs from their five albums and will cover fourteen centuries, from Galicia, Italy, Argentina, the British Isles, and Appalachia. A Stephenson Memorial Concert.

Oct. 28 3:00	FOUNDERS' DAY CONVOCATION This Convocation will celebrate Berea's interracial history by honoring Berea College alumnus John G. Fee Moran. President Shinn will present the John G. Fee Award to the Fee Moran Family. The award ceremony will include performances by the Black Music Ensemble and reflections from one of Fee Moran's children. Sponsored by the President's Office.
Nov. 04 1:30-3:30	COLLEGE-WIDE SYMPOSIUM—ANN HAGEDORN Beyond the River: The Untold Story of the Heroes of the Underground Railroad A program of readings by Ann Hagedorn from <i>Beyond the River</i> , with original music by Allen Schwartz inspired by stories from the Underground Railroad. "This narrative tells the stories of those who helped hundreds of slaves who crossed the Ohio River at Ripley on their way to freedom and enhances our understanding of the social and political climate which compelled people to lead secret lives to support justice and equality." Questions, answers, and dialogue will follow as part of the presentation. Made possible by the generous gift of James Bartlett, Berea College Trustee, and his wife, Hanna Bartlett. Classes and non-essential labor are dismissed at noon until the close of the Symposium. This is a two-hour event.
Nov. 11 *8:00	interACT DRAMA GROUP A performance by interACT, a California State Long Beach University theater troupe, that helps foster dialogue on racism. The student actor-educators reflect the diversity on college campuses, and use highly interactive drama techniques to involve the audience in the production. Co-sponsored by the Center for Excellence in Learning through Service (CELTS) and the Black Cultural Center.
Nov. 18 3:00 *8:00	KARTIK SESHDARI, sitar An Informance Kartik Seshadri, internationally acclaimed as one of the outstanding representatives of the younger generation of classical musicians, is the foremost disciple of Pandit Ravi Shankar on sitar. During the informance, he will explain Indian instruments and music, and the ensemble of sitar, tabla and, tamboura will perform. (A GSTR 109 event) In Concert with the ensemble Kartik Seshadri performs extensively in major venues throughout India and abroad, individualizing the ageless music from the powerful Indian traditions. Dec. 02 *8:00	GEORGE WINSTON Known worldwide as a Windham Hill recording artist of New Age piano music, George Winston is also the founder of Dancing Cat Records. This program will feature not the piano but his expertise with Hawaiian slack key guitar music.

Jan.17 10-11:00 Monday	PASSIN' IT ON is a documentary portraying the Black Panthers in the Civil Rights Movement. Utilizing archival news footage, personal accounts, and a rich jazz score, it offers important insights in the political debates crucial to the generations coming of age after the 1960s.
3:00	RICKY L. JONES The Lost King: The Liberating Man and the Oppressive Myth of Martin Luther King, Jr. Jones is Associate Professor, Chair, and Political Science specialist in the Department of Pan-African Studies at the University of Louisville. Cosponsored by the Black Cultural Center and the Campus Christian Center. The Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Convocation.
Feb. 03 3:00	CHARLES E. PACE The Evolution, the Myth, and the Real Malcolm X Professor Pace is a "living history" performer who explores the activist role of African-Americans from the past 200 years in their quest for democracy at home and abroad. Today he will portray Malcolm X, the controversial political activist, whose uncompromising self-critique, driving quest for knowledge, and conversion to Islam transformed this ex-con into an internationally respected spokesman for human rights.
Feb. 10 *8:00	THE HINDS SISTERS A Treasury of Trios, Duets, and Solos From the New York and Berlin Philharmonic Orchestras to the Rome and Netherlands Opera, the Hinds Sisters have captured the hearts and souls of audiences with their unique and wide-ranging musical performances. Their program covers four centuries of vocal music from Baroque to opera to madrigals and modern classics. They will close with African-American spirituals. A Stephenson Memorial Concert. Feb. 17 3:00	QUINTARD TAYLOR The Black West Begins Here: Black Kentucky and the African American West Dr. Taylor is the Scott and Dorothy Bullitt Professor of American History at the University of Washington. He has written and lectured extensively on African American life and experiences in the American West. Sponsored by the Black Cultural Center. Carter G. Woodson Memorial Convocation.
Feb. 24 3:00	CAROLYN SHOEMAKER When Are We Going to Get There? The Search for Near-Earth Objects is a planetary astronomer who has searched the skies, from the American Southwest to the Australian Outback, for asteroids that pose a danger to the earth. Her work has enhanced the discovery of more than 800 asteroids, 32 comets, and numerous meteorites. Berea College Science Lecture.
Mar. 03 3:00	SUSAN BORDO Changing Reflections in the Mirror of Culture holds the Otis A. Singletary Chair in the Humanities at the University of Kentucky. Her media-illustrated talk will explore how our celebrity and "perfection-dominated" culture has altered our ideas about beauty, race, gender, and the body. Mar. 10 *8:00	IMANI WINDS Winds of Change: Urban Classical Music The goal of Imani ("faith" in Swahili) is to bring classical music to a new, multicultural generation. Playing flute, oboe, clarinet, French horn and bassoon, the members of this innovative woodwind quintet from New York City explore the links between European, African, Latin, and American music. Mar. 17 3:00	SUMIT GANGULY Indio-U. S. Relations holds the Rabindranath Tagore Chair in Indian Cultures and Civilizations at Indiana University, where he directs the India Studies Program. Dr. Ganguly will present an historical background of relations between India and the U.S. and discuss the changes at the end of the Cold War. His talk will explore the interest of this relationship to the contemporary world. The Begley VanCleave Lecture. Co-sponsored with the International Center.
Apr. 07 3:00	HARMONIOUS WAIL Gypsy Swing Music Inspired by the music of Django Reinhardt and Stephane Grappelli, this ensemble from Madison, Wisconsin blends a variety of styles—American jazz, contemporary folk, and Eastern European gypsy swing—to create their unique sound of mandolin-heavy gypsy jazz, with vocals, bass, and guitar.
Apr. 14 *8:00	SAMITE AND TRIO Music for World Harmony A musician, composer and recording artist from Uganda, Samite mesmerizes audiences with original compositions sung in his mother tongue, Lagana, and played on the litungu (seven-stringed Kenyan instrument), kalimba/thumb/finger piano), marimba, and various flutes. His music opens minds and hearts to common threads of human concern while also revealing the soul of Africa. (A GSTR 109 event)
