

<u>Citing in Modern Language Association (MLA) Style:</u> <u>9th Edition</u>

When, Where, and Why do We Cite?

- When: When we <u>auote</u>, <u>paraphrase</u>, and <u>use</u> other people's writing, ideas, statistics, and/or images.
- Where: We must cite <u>inside</u> our own paper (using in-text citations) and on our <u>reference page</u> at the end of our paper.
- Why: To give credit to others for their work and to give credibility to our own argument.

Works Cited Entries

- 8.) Publication Date
- 9.) Location*

••••Not all the information you need for citing is always available. Find what you can and leave out any missing elements.

 <u>Title of Container</u> – journal, newspaper, website, YouTube channel, social media page, etc.

Location – page number(s), website
 URL

When Should I Use Italics and/or "Quotation Marks?"

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- Book titles: *Italics*
- Articles/ Periodicals: "Quotation Marks"
- Movie title: *Italics*
- Songs/Poems: "Quotation Marks"
- Website titles: *Italics*
- Albums: "Quotation Marks"

In-Text Citations

- When the sentence <u>does not contain the author's name</u>, give last name and location:
 - e.g. "The themes of war being peace and freedom being slavery are highly criticized throughout" (Jones 4).
- When the <u>author is in the sentence</u>, just the page/paragraph is given.
 - \circ e.g. "George Orwell critiques the slogan 'War is Peace'" (4).
- List all names when two or three authors are cited:
 - e.g. (Jones, Williams, & Porter 44-52).
- Abbreviate when three or more authors are listed:
 - \circ e.g. (Jones et al 44–52).
- If you are using <u>multiple texts by one author</u>, you give the last name, the shortened title, and then the location:
 - e.g. (Doe *Policy* 15).
- If <u>no author is listed</u>, give shortened title of piece and location:
 e.g. ("Table Tent" 22).
- <u>No page number</u>? See p. 159 of your *Trail Guide to Writing (4th edition)* for options.
