Everything your student needs to know about changing their labor position

At Berea College all of our first-year, exchange, and transfer students are centrally placed in a labor assignment from the Labor Program Office. Here is more information on what your student can do if she/he would like to change assignments as they prepare for their upcoming search.

When a student is interested in securing a new position s/he should explore position opportunities with guidance from their academic advisor, current labor supervisor, the Office of First-Year Initiatives, the Labor Program Office or the Office of Career Development.

Some students choose to pursue positions related to their academic major to help gain experience in their field of interest, while

others choose positions in areas that are going to broaden their interests and provide skills that will transfer into the broader workforce after graduation. Many departments actively promote their positions, but students are encouraged to contact areas or departments that they are interested in working for and ask about the application process. Since Berea is a work college virtually every area on campus employs students, meaning there are almost unlimited options available. Once the student has identified their desired position they should contact the individual labor department to determine the appropriate application process and deadline. Each department application process may be different; some may have a fillable application

while others may prefer to review a resume and interview. The new

If your student is interested in getting additional preparation for the interview process, encourage them to make an appointment at Career Development through their new online system, Handshake. If your student is interested in changing labor positions, labor status forms are due **Friday**, **March 30** for the 2018-19 academic year.

Five things you should know before filing your 2017 taxes

Please read! Don't risk having to re-file your return!

It is important to be aware that Berea College students and their families are typically **not eligible for Education Credits** when filing federal and state taxes!

- 1. Because 100% of tuition at Berea College is covered for all students through grants and scholarships, you do not have tuition costs that would make you eligible for the credit.
- 2. Although some families have out of pocket costs for housing and meals, housing and meal costs (and other personal costs) do **not** meet the IRS definition of qualified education expenses for claiming Education Credits.
- 3. While most students and/or their families pay some out of pocket expenses for books and required fees, which do meet the IRS definition of qualified education expenses, in almost all cases these costs will be exceeded by the student's labor earnings. Labor earnings are considered "tax-free educational assistance" under IRS

- guidelines and must be subtracted from any qualified education expenses in determining eligibility for the credit. For all or nearly all Berea College students, labor earnings for the year will be more than out of pocket costs for qualified expenses, meaning they are ineligible for the Education Credit.
- f. Student Financial Aid Services will send a tax letter to your student's CPO by February which will specify the total amount of labor earnings, as well as other details about the student's costs and financial aid received.
- 5. If you believe you may be eligible to claim an Education Credit, please contact Student Financial Aid Services

at 859.985.3310 to determine this, in order to avoid potentially having to file an amended return if you claim the credit in error.

Understanding your student's academic performance

Being involved in your student's education will have a positive impact!

With a full term of college under their belt, we're sure that your student has a better understanding of the academic lingo than they did just a few months ago. To make sure that you're up to speed with what they're talking about, here are a few key terms and phrases that you should know that can help you have conversations with your student about their progress at Berea:

Credits

The majority of courses at Berea College earn students 1-credit toward graduation. There are a few .5 credit courses available, such as WEL 101, and several .25 credit courses for things like physical activity courses and other special topics. Students are required to be enrolled in 3.0 credits each term to be

considered a full-time student, and must earn 32-credits to graduate.

Grade Point Average (GPA)

The College GPA is an extremely important number to every student. Students will see their term GPA which calculates their performance in that particular term, and also a Cumulative GPA, which calculates their performance over their entire college career at Berea. Students must maintain a Cumulative GPA of above 2.0 to stay off of Academic Probation.

Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP)

In order to keep students on track to graduation in eight-terms, the College has a set of SAP guidelines to help guide them. The student GPA should always stay above 2.0, and they are expected to earn 4-credits each academic term, though students can take fewer credits at times as long as they stay above the Minimum Credits Earned guide in the SAP Chart. To review the Satisfactory Academic Progress guidelines in full, visit www.berea.edu and type "SAP Chart" into the search tool.

Academic Probation

A student can end up on Academic Probation if they begin to fall behind the SAP Chart above, or if they fail to successfully pass 3-credits in a regular academic term. Probation prevents students from doing things like travel abroad or have an internship, but does not



appear on their

academic

achieve a 3.4 CPA or higher while being enrolled in a minimum of 4.0 credits.

All first-year students will designate an Exploratory Area of Interest during the spring term of the first year. Students are prompted to engage with the many academic disciplines offered by the College to narrow down their choices. After the student has identified an Exploratory Major, a new advisor in that field of study will be assigned, unless their current first-year advisor is already in that major and available to provide service during the student's second year. This year the deadline for Exploratory Area of Interest is February 26, 2018.
