FOR FALL TERM, 2023
April 10-19, 2023

We hope you are ready to register for another term at Berea. Please arrange to meet with your advisor between Monday, March 27 and Friday, April 7 to plan your schedule. You should include alternate courses in the event your preferred courses are not available at the time of registration.

COMPLETE THE FOLLOWING PROCEDURES IN THE ORDER GIVEN FOR REGISTRATION:

1. Contact your academic advisor for an appointment to plan your academic program.
2. You are expected to do preliminary planning of your schedule prior to your meeting with your advisor. Also, be prepared to discuss with your advisor your future career plans and how you are currently progressing. Please bring a copy of your degree audit (listed as Degree Evaluation) along with other relevant materials with you to the appointment with your advisor.
3. After your schedule(s) is completed, your advisor will give you an alternate PIN (which is a Personal Identification Number to use for registration only). This PIN is equivalent to the advisor's signature and indicates that the two of you have met and completed the schedule planning process. You will be asked for your Alternate Pin after you go in to the Registration screens. **Please take care not to misplace this important part of your registration information – only your advisor can give it to you again.** The Office of the Registrar will not provide a student with their PIN during the initial registration period.
4. Use your alternate PIN to begin your registration on myBerea according to the schedule below. (You will not be able to register until your scheduled time. Action Item Processing must also be completed before you will be able to register.) The Web registration screens provide instructions on how to proceed with registration.
5. Please be aware that your labor contract for fall must be completed prior to registration.

ORDER OF REGISTRATION

Registration day and time is determined by the number of credits you have earned (**does not include the credits for which you are currently enrolled**). Please check the menu on myBerea for the section "Check your Registration Status" to view your assigned time for registration. This will also give you access to see if you have any holds that would prevent your registration (Emergency Contact Information Update, Financial Aid, Student Payroll, Student Accounts). Any holds will need to be cleared through the office that placed the hold on your record before you can register.

CLOSED CLASSES, COURSE TIME CONFLICTS, PREREQUISITES

You will not be required to get the signature of your advisor if you encounter closed classes, have a course time conflict, or if you have problems with prerequisites. Instead, please contact the instructor of the course. If you are given permission to enroll in the course, that instructor will process the override and you must then register for the course by going back to the Web Registration page in myBerea.

INTERNSHIP AND INDEPENDENT STUDY

To register for any Internship, you must submit the appropriate application materials with required signatures to the Internship Office. Be sure you are aware of deadlines. The Internship Office will submit a list of the approved internships to the Office of the Registrar (116 Lincoln Hall) for registration processing.

REGISTRATION PROCEDURES FOR APPLIED MUSIC (PRIVATE LESSONS)

You will sign up for these courses in the Music Building (Presser Hall) at the beginning of the Fall and Spring terms. The Registrar will register you for these courses once the list of students is complete.

CHANGE OF PROGRAM (DROPPING/ADDING COURSES)

You will be permitted to drop-add, without fee, anytime between the time you register and Tuesday, August 29, 2023 by Web Registration. After these dates, you are not permitted to add a course. To withdraw from a course, you will need to process an electronic [drop form](#) from the Registrar's Forms Page with your advisor's signature. Any course withdrawals after August 29, 2023 will be assigned a withdrawal grade.

POLICY REGARDING COURSES DROPPED

Courses dropped during official registration periods or the date posted on the [Fall Academic Calendar](#) will not be reflected on the permanent record. The letter "W" (withdrawn) will be used to indicate courses dropped during the time indicated to withdraw from a course with a grade of W on the academic calendar. You may withdraw from a course during the time indicated to receive a WP or WF on the academic calendar and your instructor will be asked to indicate the quality of any completed work to that point with a "WP" (withdrawn passing) or a "WF" (withdrawn failing). No course may be dropped during the final seven weeks of the term. WP/WF will not be counted in calculating the GPA. (See calendar above for official drop/withdrawal dates.)

TEACHER CERTIFICATION

Students planning to complete requirements for teacher certification must follow the guidelines given in “Program for Preparation for Teachers” in the Berea College Catalog.

COURSE FEES

Course fees, shown in the Schedule of Classes and in the current Berea College Catalog, are charged to the student’s account. The fee is automatically charged upon registration for the course. The student’s account is credited if the course is dropped by the end of the first week of class as indicated in the official College calendar.

SCHEDULE OF CLASS HOURS

Letters following course numbers (A, B, C, etc.) indicate sections of the same course. Letters attached to the course (i.e., 186A) indicate a specialized topic. The time of the class meeting is indicated by CLOCK hours, (e.g., 0800 is 8:00 am, 1000 for 10:00 am, 0100 for 1:00 pm). The days of class meetings are indicated as follows: M=Monday, T=Tuesday, W=Wednesday, R=Thursday, F=Friday, Saturday=ST.

CONVOCATION CREDIT

All students will automatically be enrolled in a .25 credit convocation course (CNV 100) during each of their regular terms of enrollment, with the exception of the final term of enrollment, for a maximum of eight such terms. For each term of enrollment in CNV 100, the student will earn a grade of CA (which is calculated as an A in the GPA) for attending at least seven convocations. The grade of CF (which is calculated as an F in the GPA) will be awarded for attendance at fewer than seven convocations. Enrollment in this course is optional during the final term at Berea and is prohibited if the student has already enrolled in this course eight terms.

IMPORTANT

Course Loads: The Maximum course credit load is 4.5 for all full-time students. Requests for course overloads can be made by the student by completing an [Overload Form](#) which is available on the forms page of the Registrar’s webpage. Overloads will be added to the student schedule after the necessary approval signatures are collected electronically.

Underloads: For degree candidates, all class underloads (less than 3 credits) must have prior approval of the Student Admission and Academic Standing Committee. Requests for course underloads should be submitted to the Office of Academic Services (110 Lincoln Hall).

SATISFACTORY ACADEMIC PROGRESS

Students will be placed on Academic Probation at the end of any regular term for failure to maintain a minimum 2.0 cumulative grade point average (GPA) or meet the credits requirement identified in the Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) chart listed in the College Catalog (<http://catalog.berea.edu/Current/Catalog>).

Students who are deficient in meeting the SAP requirements may make up the deficiency during the Summer Term at Berea College or another regionally accredited institution. If credit is to be earned elsewhere, permission must be secured by completing the [Application for Transfer Credit form](#) prior to enrollment.

Fall 2023 Special Topics Course Descriptions

CSC 186 DW1 & DW2: Intro to Web Development

Introduction to Web Development acquaints students with creative web development for desktop and mobile devices. Students will explore the general history and behind-the-scenes of the world-wide web. Each small group of students will propose, design, and implement a website to promote a community organization or event. Their websites will separate structure, presentation, and interaction using standards-based HTML, CSS, and JavaScript respectively. This class does not require any programming experience. It does not count for credit for students who have already taken CSC236 Data Structures.

ARH 486 BA: Anthropological Archaeology Past Present Future

Divided into three modules, this class serves as the capstone for the independent anthropological archaeology majors. The first part of the class will be an exploration of the history of anthropological archeology. Students will engage with seminal works of key archaeologists as a means to understand the development of archaeological theory and method. Using contemporary material, students will explore the ways in which archaeologists have incorporated a range of theory and method into their research and will expose students to the range of archaeology being practiced today. The preponderance of readings will be by women, black, and indigenous archaeologists. Finally, students will conduct their own anthropological archaeological research culminating in a final paper and formal presentation to the public. While archaeological excavation is not logistically possible, student research may involve analysis of artifact assemblages, review and reevaluation of other archaeological investigation, or an extensive critical literature review of research on a specific regional/period in their area of interest.

LES 286 DH: Legal Reasoning and Advocacy

Students in this course will explore a complex case problem designed to simulate the appeal of a proceeding via a writ of certiorari to the Supreme Court of the United States (SCOTUS). As in real arguments before the SCOTUS, students will learn the case law spanning a large number of real-world earlier written opinions issued by both the SCOTUS and other federal circuit courts of appeal and state supreme courts in the US legal system. As part of learning this legal foundation, students will have to draft and submit formal case summaries in preparation for presenting their cases. Each student will draft and submit with one other student a formal written legal brief detailing the strengths and weaknesses of the case. In addition, having learned the case law, students will have to argue orally as both petitioner's counsel and then alternatively as respondent's counsel in various "practice panel" simulations and in one final simulation of a SCOTUS proceeding. Each student will be paired in a two-student team for purposes of the simulated oral and written appellate proceedings in the course.

ARH 286 TS: Medieval Calligraphy

The medieval period was the great age of the handwritten book. Writing was a valuable, specialized, and artistic skill, and its use helped shape the development of medieval culture and institutions. In this course we will explore the role of books and writing in the Middle Ages by examining writing styles (scripts and hands), manuscript artwork, and bookmaking techniques. Through art historical analysis, we will study manuscript artwork, including illuminations, initials, miniatures, and marginalia. We will also participate in the work of the scribe by learning and using medieval calligraphic scripts together with some medieval concepts of layout, design, and decoration using dip pens, ink, and paint to create works of calligraphic art. Related to ancient and medieval scribal work, we will also develop rudimentary skill in Latin paleography and practice transcription from medieval manuscript texts, noting how paleography and calligraphy combine to enhance both skill sets. *Course requires purchase of materials.

ETAD/CSC 286 JJ: Intro to Autonomous Systems

This course introduces students to the algorithmic and hardware foundations of robotics and artificial intelligence. Students will work in teams to design, implement and test algorithms for an autonomous navigation system for a mobile robot. In the process, students will learn basics of C++ and Python programming languages, how to gather data about the world from sensors, controlling actuators to navigate an environment, and modeling input and decisions as graphs. This is an ideal hands-on exploratory course for students in technical STEM disciplines. This course will be co-taught with students and faculty from Berea College and the University of Michigan.

EDS 186: Inquiry into Social Studies Essentials

This course is one that focuses on key social studies skills and content. While the course is offered to students who are pursuing a career in history or social studies education, it can serve as an opportunity for non-Education majors to broaden their understanding of the world around them.

Students can expect discussion topics such as geography, world cultures, economics, psychology, sociology.

EDS 286: Development and Characteristics of Exceptional Learners

This course will prepare teacher candidates to understand how human development, individual Within the student characteristics and external influences affect students with disabilities. course, students will study basic student learning and motivation. theories around human development and approaches to Teacher candidates will be able to distinguish between developmental disabilities and delays, as well as the current disability categories under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). Teacher candidates will apply these theories and characteristics of students with disabilities in lesson planning practice, field work, class discourse and personal reflections.

EDS 386: Instructional Design for Diverse Learners

This course will prepare teacher candidates to plan instruction for students with disabilities in an inclusive environment. Throughout the course, teacher candidates will be exposed effective, research based strategies in special education. to highly Teacher candidates will apply these research-based strategies as they implement general education curriculum standards, develop lesson plans, and differentiate instructional techniques for learners.

EDS 486: Class Management for All Learners

This course will prepare teacher candidates to employ strategies to focus on positive behavioral supports for students with disabilities. Throughout the coursework, teacher candidates will learn how to utilize current best practices to develop functional behavior assessments and intervention plans for students with disabilities. Teacher candidates will establish an example class behavior management system designed to meet the academic and behavior needs of students with disabilities.

AFR/HIS 386 JK: Do No Harm: A Black History of Medicine and Technology

This course examines how race, culture, and science have transformed medical and technological history from the period of enslavement to the present. Physicians, scientists, social scientists, and historians have had a long and complicated history with the construct of race. Although we have relegated controversies such as eugenics to the dustbins of history as evidence of science's racist past, we would be foolish to think that science and technology always move forward toward greater and greater enlightenment. Racist ideas about group difference persist in the ways we conceptualize and conduct scientific investigations and in how we implement clinical practice or understand and interface with technology.

AFR 286 LL: Black Education

This course assesses major arguments, conceptualizations, and theorizations on education throughout the African diaspora. Students will learn about historical/herstorical, political, economic, and psychological discourses interpreting Black communities' forever long and unending contributions to and relationships with education. Strong emphasis will be given to Black educational students', educators', thinkers', and activists' efforts to identify and combat anti Blackness, capitalism and class struggle, and sexism and heteropatriarchy within global learning systems.

CFS 386: Assessment of Young Children

This course is designed to help students gain knowledge and understanding of the purposes of assessment in relation to ethical and legal considerations. Students will learn how to choose developmentally, linguistically, and culturally appropriate tools and methods that are responsive to the characteristics of the young child and family. Using evidence-based practices, students will develop or select as well as administer informal measures, and select and administer formal measures in partnership with families and other professionals. Students will learn to analyze, interpret, document, and share assessment information using a strength-based approach with families and other professionals for eligibility determination, outcome/goal development, planning instruction and intervention, monitoring progress, and reporting.

AFR 286 LL: Intro to Hip Hop Studies

Introduction to Hip Hop Studies presents paramount elements, arguments, and theories of rap music and hip hop culture. Strong emphasis will be given to the artistic, cultural, social, and political history/herstory of hip hop culture from its origins and rise from rap music, to the music industry, to its influence and impact on cinema, mass media, and visual arts. This course calls attention to rap music's and hip hop culture's contributions to the critical study of race and racism, capitalism and class struggle, as well as sexuality, sexism, and heteropatriarchy (e.g., misogynoir and homophobia). Following several hip hop studies scholars, we will critically engage rap music and hip hop culture in light of the historical/herstorical, cultural, social, and political facts of the United States' longstanding racism, sexism, capitalism, colonialism, gangsterism, materialism, and heterosexism and homophobia.

MAT 186 LG1, LG2, LG3: Enhanced College Alg w Mod

This course offers a study of algebraic functions and their uses in mathematical modeling with additional class time dedicated to mastering pre necessary to satisfy the college Algebra topics Developmental Mathematics requirement for graduation. Topics will include the realnumber system; basic concepts of functions and graphs; linear, polynomial, rational, exponential, and logarithmic functions and models; and the solutions of systems of linear equations. Applications to various disciplines will be investigated through the development and analysis of mathematical models. NOTE: Noncredit for students who completed or waived MAT 135.

Fall 2023 Art/Art History Topics Course Descriptions

ARH 130 –Latin American Art: from Precolonial to the Present

This course explores the histories of artistic production throughout Latin America – including Central America, South America, and the Caribbean. It looks at art and architecture from the pre-colonial, colonial, and modern and contemporary periods. While not covering everything, the course builds connections between the past and present. We examine, for instance, pre-colonial weaving techniques in the Andean region, how those partially changed during colonization, and how modern decolonial artists took up the forms again in the 20th century. Exploring visual art, craft, and architecture, the course builds knowledge across a range of historical periods, as well as on a variety of artistic mediums and techniques.

ART 200C: Introduction to Ceramics

Clay as an expressive artistic medium is tactile, visceral, and responsive to touch. We can find it almost everywhere in the natural environment, all over the globe. As a product, it has a rich history that reaches back beyond recorded time with a dazzlingly wide array of potential uses. Slips and glazes are good resources for adding color and visual depth to your clay work. Like clay, glazes have a rich and varied history in their practical use and artistic expression.

This course is designed to introduce beginning through intermediate ceramic students to an in-depth use of clay as a tool for functional expression and as instruction in the use of glaze and slip decorating techniques. In this course, beginning students will be asked to construct a series of projects using wheel and rudimentary hand-building processes. Intermediate students will be asked to create a series of projects exploring personal expression and how those themes intersect with functional and sculptural Ceramics.

ART 200D: Figure Drawing

Introductory study of the human figure with emphasis on structural and proportional understanding, gesture, and the modeling of volumetric form. In addition to working from nude and clothed models, students will study anatomy and figure drawing through master copies as well as explore their own figurative interest in a final assignment.

ART 200F: Weaving the Natural World

This course is a studio art experience exploring the techniques and expressive possibilities of weaving using tapestry and the 4-harness floor loom. Using nature as inspiration for their weaving, students will engage with observational drawing, the use of natural dyes from local materials, and weaving with materials collected during nature walks. Students will write about, present, and discuss their work and the work of others. This course counts as an Arts Perspective.
